CIVIL ACTION COMPLAINT

Plaintiffs Columbus Piave Club, Friends of Christopher Columbus Foundation, Conference Of Presidents Of Major Italian American Organizations, Abruzzi Club, Order Of The Sons & Daughters Of Italy, Columbus Italian Heritage Foundation, the Columbus Italian Club, The Estate Of Edoardo Alfieri, John C. Cardi, Giacomo Conte, Rick Brunetto, and Landa Masdea Brunetto (“Plaintiffs”), by and through their undersigned counsel, hereby files this Civil Action Complaint against Defendants City Of Columbus, Andrew Ginther, Diane Nance, Chip Santer, Eliza Ho, Merjin Van der Heijden, Mary Gray, Matthew Mohr, Lisa McLymont, Shelbi Toone, Gamal Brown, Gregory Corbin, United States Department Of Justice, United States Department Of Housing And Urban Development, United States Department Of Transportation, United States Department Of Commerce, United States Department Of Education, United States Department Of Homeland Security, United States Department Of Agriculture (“Defendants”), alleging as follows:

NATURE OF THE ACTION

1. This case concerns the illegal – and discriminatory – removal of the Christopher Columbus Statue (the “Statue”) from Columbus City Hall.
2. This Statue, depicting the literal namesake of the City of Columbus, had stood proudly since 1955 as a shining symbol of the Italian-American community and the challenges they faced coming to America.
3. In the summer of 2020, however, Defendant Andrew Ginther ordered the removal of this Statue – notwithstanding his total lack of authority to do so.
4. There has never been any legal basis for the removal of this Statue, nor is there any legal authority for its continued absence from its intended location outside of Columbus City Hall.

5. These illegal actions have continued to the present day – entailing a perverse combination of state and federal government actors – and Plaintiffs bring the present action to finally put an end to this ongoing injustice.

6. For the reasons outlined herein, Plaintiffs respectfully ask that this Court vindicate their constitutional rights, cease the flow of illegal funds to culpable parties, and order the return of the Statue to its rightful location.

THE PARTIES

7. Plaintiff Columbus Piave Club (the “Piave Club”) is the oldest Italian-American social organization in Central Ohio, and is dedicated to preserving and promoting the rich cultural heritage and traditions of the Italian community in Columbus.¹ Its mailing address is PO Box 580, New Albany, OH 43054.

8. Plaintiff Friends of Christopher Columbus Foundation (“FOCCF”) is an emerging nonprofit operating in the Columbus, Ohio area. Its mission is to preserve and protect the important legacy of Christopher Columbus, including through public artwork commemorating the same.² It can be served at 6545 Market Ave. N., Ste. 100, Canton, OH 44721.

9. Plaintiff Conference Of Presidents Of Major Italian American Organizations (“COPOMAIO”) is a national coalition of 74 cultural, educational, and fraternal Italian-American organizations, whose mission is to enhance the image of Americans of Italian descent at all levels of society, and to eliminate prejudice, discrimination, and defamation detractive thereof.³ It can be served at 140 Riverside Drive, Suite 2602, New York, NY 10024.

10. Plaintiff Abruzzi Club is an organization originally formed by recent immigrants from the Abruzzo region of Italy. The purpose of the club is to share traditions, customs, and ideas, as well as to promote fraternal love and camaraderie among the membership.⁴ It can be served at 273 Hanawalt Road, Westerville, OH 43081.

11. Plaintiff Order of the Sons & Daughters of Italy, Columbus Lodge 2599 (“OSDI”) is an organization dedicated to promoting Italian-American culture, traditions, language, legacies, and contributions.⁵ It can be served at 1070 Thomas Lane, Columbus, OH 43220.

12. Plaintiff Columbus Italian Heritage Foundation (“CIHF”) is a charitable organization based out of Columbus, OH. It can be served at 1070 Thomas Lane, Columbus, OH 43220.

13. Plaintiff Columbus Italian Club (“CIC”) is an organization that “embraces the values of our Italian heritage and emphasizes family, friendships, hard work, fun, food and wine.”⁶

14. Plaintiff The Estate of Edoardo Alfieri (the “Estate”) is represented by Stefania Maisano and Silvana Maisano. The Estate is an Italian citizen, run by Genovese citizens. It exists to further the legacy and protect the artwork of Edoardo Alfieri. The Estate can be served at Via Sant’Ugo 5/1, 16135 Genoa, GE, Italy.

15. The Piave Club, FOCCF, COPOMAIO, Abruzzi Club, OSDI, the Estate, CIC, and CIHF are referred to herein as the “Organizational Plaintiffs.”

16. The Organization Plaintiffs have members that are of Genovese ancestry.

17. Plaintiff Giacomo Conte (“Plaintiff Conte”) is an adult individual and Ohio citizen who can be served at 3010 Hayden Rd., Columbus, OH 43235. He is of Italian-American descent.

18. Plaintiff John Cardi (“Plaintiff Cardi”) is an adult individual and Ohio citizen who can be served at 3010 Hayden Rd., Columbus, OH 43235. He is of Italian-American descent.

19. Plaintiff Rick Brunetto is an adult individual and Ohio citizen who can be served at 3010 Hayden Rd., Columbus, OH 43235. He is of Italian-American descent.

20. Plaintiff Landa Masdea Brunetto is an adult individual and Ohio citizen who can be served at 3010 Hayden Rd., Columbus, OH 43235. She is of Italian-American descent.

21. Defendant City of Columbus is the capital and most populous city of the State of Ohio. It can be served at 90 West Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215.

22. Defendant Andrew Ginther (“Defendant Ginther”) is an adult who is the current mayor of the City of Columbus. He can be served at City Hall 2nd Floor, 90 West Broad Street, Columbus, OH 43215.

23. Defendant Diane Nance (“Defendant Nance”) is an adult who was a member of the Columbus Art Commission. She can be served at 111 North Front Street, Columbus, OH 43215.

24. Defendant Chip Santer (“Defendant Santer”) is an adult who was a member of the Columbus Art Commission. He can be served at 111 North Front Street, Columbus, OH 43215.

25. Defendant Eliza Ho (“Defendant Ho”) is an adult who is a member of the Columbus Art Commission. She can be served at 111 North Front Street, Columbus, OH 43215.

26. Defendant Merjin Van der Heijden (“Defendant Van der Heijden”) is an adult who is Chair of the Columbus Art Commission. She can be served at 111 North Front Street, Columbus, OH 43215.

27. Defendant Mary Gray (“Defendant Gray”) is an adult who is a member of the Columbus Art Commission. She can be served at 111 North Front Street, Columbus, OH 43215.

28. Defendant Matthew Mohr (“Defendant Mohr”) is an adult who was a member of the Columbus Art Commission. He can be served at 111 North Front Street, Columbus, OH 43215.

29. Defendant Lisa McLymont (“Defendant McLymont”) is an adult who is Vice Chair of the Columbus Art Commission. She can be served at 111 North Front Street, Columbus, OH 43215.

30. Defendant Shelbi Toone (“Defendant Toone”) is an adult who is a member of the Columbus Art Commission. She can be served at 111 North Front Street, Columbus, OH 43215.

31. Defendant Gamal Brown (“Defendant Brown”) is an adult who is a member of the Columbus Art Commission. She can be served at 111 North Front Street, Columbus, OH 43215.

32. Defendant Gregory Corbin (“Defendant Corbin”) is an adult who is a member of the Columbus Art Commission. He can be served at 111 North Front Street, Columbus, OH 43215.

33. Defendants Nance, Santer, Ho, Van der Heijden, Gray, Mohr, McLymont, Toone, Brown, and Corbin are referred to herein as the “Art Commission Defendants.”

34. Defendant Ginther, the City of Columbus, and the Art Commission Defendants are then collectively referred to as the “State Defendants.”

35. Defendant United States Department of Transportation (“DOT”) is a federal agency that can be served at 1200 New Jersey Avenue SE, Washington, D.C.

36. Defendant United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (“HUD”) is a federal agency that can be served at 451 7th St., SW, Washington, DC 20410.

37. Defendant United States Department of Justice (“DOJ”) is a federal agency that can be served at 950 Pennsylvania Avenue NW, Washington, D.C. 20530.

38. Defendant United States Department of Commerce (“DOC”) is a federal agency that can be served at 1401 Constitution Avenue NW, Washington, D.C. 20230.

39. Defendant United States Department of Education (“ED”) is a federal agency that can be served at 400 Maryland Ave, SW, Washington, DC 20202.

40. Defendant United States Department of Homeland Security (“DHS”) is a federal agency that can be served at 2707 Martin Luther King Jr Ave SE, Washington, DC 20528-0525.

41. Defendant United States Department of Agriculture (“USDA”) is a federal agency that can be served at 1400 Independence Ave SW, Washington, DC 20250.

42. DOT, HUD, DOJ, DOC, ED, DHS, and USDA are collectively referred to herein as the “Federal Defendants.”

JURISDICTION AND VENUE

43. This Court has subject matter jurisdiction over this matter pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1331, as this case arises out of the Constitution, laws, or treaties of the United States.

44. Venue is proper in this District under 28 U.S.C. § 1391(b), as several Defendants reside in this District, and a substantial part of the events or omissions giving rise to these claims arose in this District.

45. Therefore, this Court has proper venue over this matter, and personal jurisdiction over all parties.

FACTS COMMON TO ALL COUNTS

a) The History of the Statue and City of Columbus

46. Globally, there are countless countries, provinces, cities, districts, streets, and buildings named after Christopher Columbus, the famed Italian explorer who discovered the New World.

47. The largest such city in the United States named after Christopher Columbus is Columbus, Ohio.

48. To further commemorate this illustrious connection between the City of Columbus and the man himself, the City entered into its first “sister cities” agreement on October 12, 1955 – *i.e.* Columbus Day – with Genoa, Italy.⁷

49. In addition to being a world-renowned center of art, music, and cuisine, the City of Genoa is also famous as the birthplace of Christopher Columbus.

50. The City of Columbus specifically chose the City of Genoa as its inaugural sister city because of this connection to the former’s namesake.

51. At the signing of this agreement – an event attended by over 100,000 people, or approximately 30% of the City of Columbus’ total population at the time – the City of Genoa bequeathed a 22-foot-tall bronze Statue to its counterpart, which such Statue was then to be displayed prominently in front of Columbus City Hall forever more. *See* October 13, 1955 Ohio State Journal, attached hereto as **Exhibit A**.

52. Among the crowd was Governor Frank Lausche, Senator John W. Bricker, Representative John M. Vorys, as well as a bevy of other state and local officials. *Id.*

53. Similarly, the Eisenhower Administration sent Special Assistant and diplomat Harold E. Stassen to provide a formal federal endorsement of this exchange, which he did through his public remarks at the unveiling. *Id.*

54. Weighing three and a half tons, this Statue was crafted by acclaimed Italian sculptor Edoardo Alfieri (“Alfieri”), one of the most successful sculptors of the 20th Century.

55. In dedicating this Statue to the fellowship between these two cities, Alfieri wrote:

TO THE CITIZENS OF COLUMBUS OHIO

It is difficult to say everything I feel in one minute. **It is as if I had left a little of my heart in your town.** I feel I am living with you once more these days; I see your river again, your country, the friends of Columbus, as generous as brothers. I see your town-hall again, your kind mayor [Sensenbrenner], and high above you all, my “Cristefer Columbus” so[] much desired by all of you.

I am glad that **this work of mine** makes all those who look at it think, in the centuries, of the great navigator, and **makes your heart throb with a brotherly love for Genoa,** Cristefer Colombus’s birthplace.

It has been a great joy for me to work and sculpture for you and I hope to be able to see you again, my friends. Health and happiness to the Citizen of Columbus, Ohio.

See Letter to Citizens of Columbus, attached hereto as **Exhibit B** (emphasis added).

56. The affection that Alfieri felt for this area was reciprocated by the City of Columbus, which soon thereafter offered him a teaching position at The Ohio State University.

See January 13, 1956 Letter to Senator Bricker, attached hereto as **Exhibit C**.

57. This exchange of the Statue between the two cities was facilitated by Plaintiff Piave Club, which therefore holds a particularized and special connection to such Statue.

58. Likewise, the Organizational Plaintiffs – comprised of individuals with Genovese ancestry – similarly hold a particularized and special connection to such Statue.

59. The City of Genoa sent Deputy Mayor Giuseppa de Andre to consummate this transaction on its behalf with Columbus Day co-chairmen Edward Wagner and Sal Spalla, along with former Columbus Mayor Sensenbrenner. See October 11, 1955 Ohio State Journal, attached hereto as **Exhibit D**.

60. This Statue was donated to the City of Columbus with the *express understanding* and requirement that it be prominently displayed outside Columbus City Hall, as a testament to the intense bond between these two cities, as well as their shared celebration of Italian culture.

61. Contemporaneous newspaper accounts of this transfer indicate that the City of Columbus agreed to keep the Statue outside of City Hall “**for eternity.**” *See* October 11, 1955 Columbus Citizen, attached hereto as **Exhibit E** (emphasis added).

62. Former Mayor Sensenbrenner’s public remarks reaffirm that the Statue was to be maintained and cherished **forever,** in the exact spot in which it was dedicated.

63. Relevantly:

It seems to me that the only logical expression of gratitude would be for us to prove to the people of Genoa and to the whole world, **our sincerity in maintaining international good will.** This means **the carrying forward** of the Democratic principles upon which our nation was founded and which your nation is so ardently striving to strengthen. The people of all nations desire only peace and prosperity. **The people of Columbus accept this statue and will ever cherish** the spirit in which it was tendered to us.

As Mayor of the City of Columbus, Ohio, I fervently pray that the ideals of peace and brotherhood **will always prevail.**

May this statute of your great countryman **serve as an inspiration to both countries for many generations to come.** With the help of God, and the good will of these two nations, **may Italy and America continue in a lasting friendship and peace.**

See Former Mayor Sensenbrenner Public Remarks, attached hereto as **Exhibit F** (emphasis added).

64. This arrangement has been reaffirmed over the years, including a **unanimous** resolution of the Columbus City Council in 2015 (the “2015 Resolution”). *See generally* Legislative Summary of 2015 Resolution, attached hereto as **Exhibit G**.

65. This 2015 Resolution was enacted “[t]o acknowledge and celebrate the 60th anniversary of the rich and long standing relationship that Columbus, Ohio USA and Genoa, Italy have fostered; and **to encourage even stronger social, cultural, and business related partnerships** through Sister Cities International **in the years to come.**” *See* Ex. G (emphasis added).

66. It obviously does not strengthen the relationship with the City of Genoa, however, for the City of Columbus to tear down the invaluable Statue that was bequeathed to it as part of this arrangement.

67. The Statue is an essential element of the Sister Cities Agreement between these two cities – it depicts a famous Genovese man, who is also the namesake of the City of Columbus – and this majestic piece of artwork unifies these two great cities.

68. Neither the Piave Club, the Estate, nor the City of Genoa, ever consented to the removal of this Statue, which was only given to the City of Columbus under the condition that it be displayed outside of City Hall **forever**.

69. The Estate holds exclusive rights to the ongoing interests of the deceased Alfieri, including preserving the legacy and location of his artwork.

70. The State Defendants' actions therefore stand in express violation of the donation agreement, as well as a **unanimous** resolution by the Columbus City Council, and every day that this non-compliance continues is a violation of the same.

b) Federal Funding Issued in Violation of the National Historic Preservation Act

71. The National Historic Preservation Act (“NHPA”) is a federal statute enacted in 1966 to preserve our Nation’s historic buildings, monuments, and artifacts.

72. It imposes sweeping requirements on federal actors before they approve the disbursement of federal funds or issue permits, including a rigorous preemptive review process.

73. The Code of Federal Regulations explains that this “process seeks to accommodate historic preservation concerns with the needs of Federal undertakings through consultation among the agency official **and other parties with an interest** in the effects of the undertaking on historic

properties, **commencing at the early stages of project planning.**” 36 C.F.R. § 800.1(a) (emphasis added).

74. The goal of this process “is to identify historic properties potentially affected by the undertaking, assess its effects and seek ways to **avoid, minimize or mitigate any adverse effects on historic properties.**” *Id.* (emphasis added).

75. Notably, this process is **mandatory** – 36 C.F.R. § 800.1(c) includes the qualifier “must” – and the agency “shall ensure that the [historic review] is *initiated early* in the undertaking’s planning, so that a broad range of alternatives may be considered during the planning process for the undertaking.” *Id.*

76. Federal agencies – including the Defendant agencies – like to pay lip service to the NHPA, promoting their supposedly zealous compliance with the statute.

77. For instance, HUD claims that it “encourages the rehabilitation of historic buildings **and the preservation of irreplaceable resources**[,]” and explicitly acknowledges its obligation “to protect historic properties and to avoid, minimize, or mitigate possible harm that may result from agency actions.” *See Exhibit H*, pg. 1.

78. Likewise, Defendant DHS’ 2011 Report to the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation and the Secretary of the Interior brags that “DHS looks forward to implementing new initiatives and continuing to enhance its existing programs to identify, protect, and use historic properties” and that “DHS is constantly moving forward to meet its mission and stewardship requirements[.]” *See Exhibit I*, pg. 14.

79. Columbus City Hall is part of the Columbus Civic Center, an area previously determined to be eligible for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places as a historic district. *See* Excerpts from Main Street Dam Removal and Scioto Greenways Feasibility Study,

attached hereto as **Exhibit J**,⁸ pg. 10 (stating that the Columbus Civic Center “was determined eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NHRP) on September 14, 1988”).

80. Perhaps unsurprisingly, significant amounts of federal funds flow into this district to the State Defendants – despite the Federal Defendants complete failure to abide by their obligations under the NHPA.

81. This illegal funding since Fiscal Year 2021 is summarized below in **Table 1**:

82. Such funding includes both amounts that have already been disbursed, as well as funds that have yet to be disbursed.

83. Shockingly, however, **none** of these awards take into consideration the Federal Defendants' obligations under the NHPA in regards to the Statute, discussed further *infra*.

84. The terms of the Statue's donation were expressly ratified by the federal government, through Special Assistant to the Eisenhower Administration, Harold E. Stassen.

85. Despite this, the federal government has done **nothing** to preserve and protect the Statue.

COUNT I
(VIOLATION OF THE NATIONAL HISTORIC PRESERVATION ACT)
PLAINTIFFS v. FEDERAL DEFENDANTS

86. Plaintiffs hereby incorporate by reference all prior paragraphs as if set forth fully at length herein.

87. The NHPA establishes a national policy to “foster conditions under which our modern society and our historic property can exist in productive harmony[,]” to “provide **leadership in the preservation of the historic property** of the United States[,]” and to “**contribute to the preservation of nonfederally owned historic property** and give maximum encouragement to organizations and individuals undertaking preservation by private means[.]” 54 U.S.C. § 300101(1), (2), & (4) (emphasis added).

88. Among other things, the NHPA requires that “any Federal agency having direct or indirect jurisdiction over a proposed Federal or federally assisted undertaking in any State [], prior to the approval of the expenditure of any Federal funds on the undertaking . . . shall take into account the effect of the undertaking on any historic property.” 54 U.S.C. § 306108.

89. “Undertaking” is defined broadly by the statute and includes “a project, activity, or program funded in whole or in part under the direct or indirect jurisdiction of a Federal agency, including-- (1) those carried out by or on behalf of the Federal agency; (2) those carried out with Federal financial assistance; (3) those requiring a Federal permit, license, or approval; and (4)

those subject to State or local regulation administered pursuant to a delegation or approval by a Federal agency.” 54 U.S.C. § 300320.

90. Likewise, “historic property” is defined to include “any prehistoric or historic district, site, building, structure, or object included on, or eligible for inclusion on, the National Register, including artifacts, records, and material remains relating to the district, site, building, structure, or object.” 54 U.S.C. § 300308.

91. In short, before any federal action is taken or money disbursed, the United States must consider the impact that such action will have on any historic properties.

92. Columbus City Hall is part of the Columbus Civic Center, an area determined eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places on September 14, 1988. *See generally* Ex. J.

93. Notably, this district is independently eligible under two different bases of the NHPA: “Criterion A for its association with community planning, engineering, politics/government, and transportation in the city of Columbus, and Criterion C for its Art Deco, Neoclassical, and Renaissance Revival architecture.” Ex. J, pg. 10.

94. Columbus City Hall has been explicitly found to be a “contributing resource” to this historic designation. *See* Ex. J, pg. 15.

95. Nevertheless, when disbursing the funds outlined in **Table 1**, the Federal Defendants completely failed to take into account *any* of their obligations under the NHPA.

96. This includes, most notably, failure to “foster conditions[,]” “provide leadership[,]” or “contribute to the preservation of” the Statue.

97. This omission is glaring – and damning.

98. The Statue is perhaps the most important piece of public artwork in all of Central Ohio, located prominently in an eligible historic district, depicting the literal namesake of the city itself.

99. The Statue was specifically received by the Eisenhower Administration, in a multilateral international exchange comprising many federal, state, local, and foreign parties.

100. The Statue is required to be located outside of Columbus City Hall to maintain amicable foreign relations between the Cities of Columbus and Genoa, and the Federal Defendants know this.

101. There is no excuse for the Federal Defendants' failure to take into account the impact their action would have on the Statue.

102. Notably, *had* the Federal Defendants taken into consideration the impact their funding would have on the Statue, it becomes eminently obvious that they could quickly put an end to the wrongful conduct by the State Defendants.

103. The Statue was removed as performative virtue signaling by the State Defendants to appease the fleeting politics of the moment – they are not willing to risk a dime of federal funding to maintain this stale charade.

104. As such, each of the Federal Defendants individually has the power to compel the return of the Statue at any time, and fulfill their obligations under the NHPA.

105. Instead, the Federal Defendants ignore such legal obligations, cravenly sending millions of dollars to the State Defendants – despite knowing what these funds will support.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs respectfully request judgment in their favor, compelling all wrongfully disbursed monies to be returned, prohibition of future funds being transmitted to the

State Defendants by the Federal Defendants in violation of the NHPA, as well as costs of suit, attorneys' fees, and such other relief as is deemed just and equitable.

COUNT II
(VIOLATION OF UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION)
PLAINTIFFS v. ALL DEFENDANTS

106. Plaintiffs hereby incorporate by reference all prior paragraphs as if set forth fully at length herein.

107. Section 1 of the 14th Amendment guarantees that “No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.” U.S. Const. amend XIV, § 2.

108. Likewise, the Fifth Amendment prohibits the deprivation of “life, liberty, or property, without due process of law[.]” U.S. Const. amend V.

109. 42 U.S.C. § 1983 allows for a private right of action for any person who is deprived “of any rights, privileges, or immunities secured by the” United States Constitution.

110. 42 U.S.C. § 1988 then allows for the recovery of attorney and expert fees for a prevailing Plaintiff under § 1983.

111. Plaintiffs, as Italian-Americans, are owed equal protection of the laws.

112. Italian-Americans constitute a cognizable racial group through their common ancestry, cultural heritage, and history of discrimination.

113. The State Defendants' discrimination against Italian-Americans, enacted under color of state law, violates these federal rights.

114. No other racial or ethnic group was targeted by the State Defendants to be the subject of this discrimination, and such Defendants chose Christopher Columbus – the preeminent representative of the Italian-American community – to accomplish their unlawful goal.

115. The State Defendants actions in this regard were therefore outrageous, despicable, and shocking.

116. Plaintiff Piave Club was also entitled to due process before the Statue – which it holds an ownership interest in – was removed from its agreed upon location.

117. Plaintiff Piave Club was never given such due process, however, nor was it compensated for the deprivation of this prized historical artifact.

118. The absence of the Statue – previously a focal point of the Central Ohio Italian-American community – has caused extreme, ongoing distress amongst such community.

119. The Federal Defendants, through their monetary support of the State Defendants, have supported this unlawful deprivation of Plaintiffs’ constitutional rights.

120. As discussed previously, at any time, the Federal Defendants can put an end to this illegal discrimination – yet they refuse to do so. *See, supra*, ¶¶ 102-105.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs respectfully requests judgment in their favor, ordering Defendants to compel the return of the Statue to its rightful place outside of Columbus City Hall, as well as, jointly and severally against all Defendants, for all compensatory, punitive, and other damages deemed just and equitable, including attorneys’ fees, expert fees, and costs of suit.

COUNT III
(VIOLATION OF OHIO CONSTITUTION)
PLAINTIFFS v. STATE DEFENDANTS

121. Plaintiffs hereby incorporate by reference all prior paragraphs as if set forth fully at length herein.

122. The Ohio Constitution provides that “All political power is inherent in the people [and] Government is instituted for their equal protection and benefit[.]” Ohio Const. art. I, § 2.

123. Plaintiffs, as Italian-American, are owed this equal protection.

124. The State Defendants have thoroughly undermined this constitutional guarantee of equal protection, through the discriminatory acts described herein.

125. The State Defendants had no legitimate basis or rationale to discriminate against Italian-Americans, making their actions outrageous, shameful, and egregious.

126. Instead, the Italian-American community was singled out as a public whipping boy by the State Defendants, leading to the illegal acts complained-of herein.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs respectfully request that this Court enter judgment in their favor against the State Defendants jointly and severally, awarding all compensatory, punitive, and other damages deemed just and proper, as well as attorneys’ fees and costs of suit.

COUNT IV
(VIOLATION OF COLUMBUS CITY CHARTER)
PLAINTIFFS v. STATE DEFENDANTS

127. Plaintiffs hereby incorporate by reference all prior paragraphs as if set forth fully at length herein.

128. The Columbus City Charter (hereinafter “Charter”) has a Historic Preservation Code whose purpose is, among other things, “to maintain and enhance the value of buildings, structures and land throughout the city.” Charter § 3101.01.

129. The Columbus Art Commission, which nominally acted on the removal of this Statue, also holds various duties.

130. This includes the responsibility to “**[a]dvocate for public art and the inclusion of public art** and artists in the design and development of public spaces and facilities.” Charter, § 3115.03(F) (emphasis added).

131. The Columbus Art Commission now stands in stark contrast with its stated mission, as it is **refusing** to advocate for the inclusion of the Statue – literally depicting the namesake of the City of Columbus and perhaps the single most important piece of public art in the entire city – in public spaces and facilities.

132. The Art Commission must also “[e]xamine, at least once every two (2) years, as city funding allows, all city monuments and works of art and **make a report to the Mayor, with recommendation for the future care and maintenance** thereof[.]” Charter, § 3115.03(D) (emphasis added).

133. The Art Commission appears to have **never** performed this task and, at a minimum, has completely failed to provide a recommendation to the Mayor “for the future care and maintenance” of the Statue.

134. Nor can the Art Commission Defendants substantively complete this task given their current posture; the only way to care and maintain the Statue is to return it to the pedestal on which it once stood, yet the Art Commission Defendants refuse to recommend this to the mayor.

135. The Statue was designed for outdoor use, it was not meant to waste away in a storage facility without any care or maintenance, as the State Defendants are now (illegally) mandating.

136. The materials and composition of the Statue are not suitable for such long-term storage, and this risks permanent and irreparable damage to it.

137. As such, the State Defendants stand in stark opposition to their stated mission, legal obligations, and ethical duties as public servants.

138. Therefore, even assuming *arguendo* that the Columbus Art Commission has jurisdiction under the Charter to regulate the Statue, they have completely failed to do so in compliance with the law.

139. Further examination of the Charter, however, reveals that the State Defendants' actions are even more legally dubious.

140. This is because, at a minimum, a separate body – the Historic Preservation and Architectural Review Commission (the “Historic Commission”) – has concurrent jurisdiction over the Statue.

141. And, Plaintiffs submit, a thorough review of the Charter reveals that the Historic Commission has *exclusive* jurisdiction over the Statue.

142. Specifically, § 3116.04 provides that “no person shall construct, reconstruct, **alter**, change the exterior color of **or demolish** any listed property or architectural feature thereof or **any structure** or architectural feature now or hereafter in a district or make site improvements thereon without first applying for a certificate of appropriateness therefor and obtaining either such certificate of appropriateness or a clearance.” *Id.* at § 3116.04 (emphasis added).

143. “Structure” is defined to include any “**monument**, work of art, or work of engineering permanently affixed to the land or any combination or any material thing of functional, aesthetic, cultural, **historical** or scientific value that may be by nature or design, **movable yet related to a specific setting or environment**[.]” *Id.* at § 3116.018 (emphasis added).

144. Likewise, “statue” is within the definition of “appurtenance” under the Charter, which then carries with it further obligations before such appurtenances can be altered. *See id.* at

§ 3116.011 (defining appurtenance - including statues); *see also id.* at § 3116.07(A) & (B) (requiring additional documentation when seeking to alter or demolish “appurtenances” like statues).

145. Not only did the State Defendants not receive *approval* from the Historic Commission to remove the Statue, but **they did not even seek it.**

146. The Historic Commission has not authorized the ongoing absence of the Statue from City Hall, and every day that passes is a continuing violation of this illegality.

147. The Art Commission purporting to act on the Statue’s removal – without the approval of the Historic Commission – is a legal nullity that is void *ab initio*.

148. There is no legal basis on which the Statue should not be at its intended location outside of Columbus City Hall at this very moment.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs respectfully request that this Court enter judgment in their favor, and compel the return of the Statue to its rightful location, and preclude the State Defendants from any ongoing attempts act on its removal without following the protocols and procedures established in the Charter.

COUNT V
(BREACH OF CONTRACT)
PLAINTIFFS PIAVE CLUB AND THE ESTATE v. STATE DEFENDANTS

149. Plaintiffs hereby incorporate by reference all prior paragraphs as if set forth fully at length herein.

150. Plaintiff Piave Club was a party to this donation agreement between the cities of Genoa and Columbus.

151. The Estate, as the ongoing representative of Alfieri, was also a party to such agreement.

152. Plaintiff Piave Club fully performed under this agreement, *i.e.* it connected the Cities of Genoa and Columbus, and successfully arranged for the transport, transfer, unveiling, and public display of the Statue.

153. Similarly, the Estate fully performed its obligations under the agreement; delivering a remarkable, one-of-a-kind Statue to stand forever more on the steps of Columbus City Hall.

154. Such agreement bequeathed the Statue on the condition that it be prominently displayed outside of Columbus City Hall – and indeed, it was for over 60 years.

155. The Statue's absence from this location violates the donation agreement between the parties.

156. Plaintiffs Piave Club and the Estate have been harmed by this breach, as the consideration they bargained for has been repudiated, and they can no longer see the Statue that they long cherished.

157. The parties expressly chose Columbus City Hall for the display of the Statue, because of its centralized location, easily accessible to the Italian-American community.

158. The location outside Columbus City Hall was also supposed to signal to the world that the City of Columbus stood behind its Italian-American community – something that is apparently no longer true – and this, too, was part of the parties' agreement upon the original transfer of the Statue.

159. Mere money damages would be completely inadequate to rectify this breach – only specific performance can make Plaintiffs Piave Club and the Estate whole here.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs Piave Club and the Estate respectfully request judgment in their favor against the State Defendants, compelling them to honor the City of Columbus' obligations

under the donation agreement, and return the Statue to its designated location outside Columbus City Hall.

COUNT VI
(VIOLATION OF THE SEPARATION OF POWERS)
PLAINTIFFS v. STATE DEFENDANTS

160. Plaintiffs hereby incorporate by reference all prior paragraphs as if set forth fully at length herein.

161. As demonstrated by the 2015 Resolution, City Council has (at a minimum) coordinate and equal power over the Statue and Sister Cities Agreement. *See generally* Ex. G.

162. The State Defendants – *i.e.* persons working in executive agencies – do not have the authority to act unilaterally in regards to either the Statue or the Sister Cities Agreement with Genoa.

163. This is a blatant abuse of executive authority, with contradicts a **unanimous** resolution passed by City Council. *See generally* Ex. G.

164. Not only did the 2015 Resolution require that this arrangement be maintained, but it also endorsed the enactment of “even **stronger** social, cultural, and business related partnerships[.]” *See* Ex. G (emphasis added).

165. Therefore, not only does it violate the 2015 Resolution for the State Defendants to ***weaken*** the relationship between the Cities of Columbus and Genoa, but they actually have an affirmative obligation to ***strengthen*** this relationship as well.

166. Just as the Mayor and his bureaucrats cannot enact new laws without approval by City Council, they cannot repudiate an express ordinance passed by City Council regarding these matters.

167. The Statue is *required* to be at its original location, and every day that passes is a continuation of this illegal conduct.

168. Given the legal obligation of the State Defendants to **strengthen** the relationship with the City of Genoa, there is a present, affirmative duty to return the Statue to its rightful place under this agreement.

169. Doing so would begin to repair the severe harm the State Defendants have done to this relationship with the City of Genoa, comport with their legal obligations, and right the wrong that they continue to manifest to this day.

170. Ultimately, it is time for the State Defendants to admit “mea culpa,” and perform their express obligations under the 2015 Resolution to strengthen the relationship between the Cities of Columbus and Genoa.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs respectfully request that judgment be entered in their favor against the State Defendants, and that the Statue be returned to its original location, which has been given the express approval of Columbus City Council, as well as attorneys’ fees, costs of suit, and such other relief deemed just and equitable.

COUNT VII
(VISUAL ARTISTS RIGHTS ACT OF 1990)
ESTATE v. STATE DEFENDANTS

171. Plaintiffs hereby incorporate by reference all prior paragraphs as if set forth fully at length herein.

172. The Visual Artists Rights Act of 1990 (“VARA”) protects the moral rights of an artist, regardless of whether they hold the copyright to such work or maintain physical possession.

173. Specifically “the author of a work of visual art . . . shall have the right . . . *to prevent any intentional distortion, mutilation, or other modification* of that work which would be

prejudicial to his or her honor or reputation, and any intentional distortion, mutilation, or modification of that work is a violation of that right, and [] *to prevent any destruction of a work of recognized stature*, and any intentional or grossly negligent destruction of that work is a violation of that right.” 17 U.S.C. § 106A(a)(3) (emphasis added).

174. Because the Statue was created before the effective date of VARA, the Estate’s moral rights are coextensive with the rights conferred to copyrights generally, regardless of if such work was ever copyrighted. *Id.* at § 106A(d)(2).

175. For works created before January 1, 1978 and *not* copyrighted (like the Statue), these rights endure for the life of the offer, plus 70 years. *See id.* at §§ 303(a) and 302(a).

176. Alfieri died in 1998, meaning his moral rights continue until 2068.

177. The Statue – as the most important piece of public art in all of Ohio – is of recognized stature, and the Estate has never consented to its destruction, modification, or mutilation.

WHEREFORE, the Estate respectfully request that judgment be entered in its favor against the State Defendants, and that the Statue be returned to its original location, which has been given the express approval of Columbus City Council, as well as attorneys’ fees, costs of suit, and such other relief deemed just and equitable.

Dignitaries Laud Statue

The massive statue of Christopher Columbus, a gift from the city of Genoa, Italy, was formally presented to Columbus, the city, Wednesday night after an estimated 100,000 spectators had massed along Broad St. to view an hour-long festive parade.

Big Parade Heightens Festivities

By JAMES SPECKMAN

A festive spirit reigned in the city during Wednesday night's Columbus Day parade and official unveiling of the Genoa statue of "The Discoverer" at City Hall.

It started slowly, then spread quickly among the thousands upon thousands of spectators for whom the celebration, whether they realized it or not, was a rediscovery of their home town, Columbus.

They lined both sides of Broad St., four to eight feet deep from east of Fourth St. to Civic Center Dr.

THE YOUNGSTERS shrilled their appreciation, the adults applauded, and:

"Oh, Yi, Yi," exclaimed a young man as a float came into view carrying a bevy of beautiful girls.

"Help me up, help me up," called a 3-year-old to his father, who like many other dads hoisted their children on their shoulders.

"This is the only time I'm sorry I'm short," said one woman.

UP AND DOWN the street, vendors hawked balloons, American and Italian flags, and souvenir programs.

More than 25,000 packed around the south plaza of City Hall as celebrities from many fields and from both the United States and Italy, marked the date on which the Genoese explorer discovered the New World.

It was the biggest throng downtown since President Eisenhower paid Columbus a visit in September, 1952, on his campaign tour and some officials said a crowd of such numbers had never massed in the immediate downtown area.

THE AUDIENCE, of which 75 per cent were children, extended on the east to the Broad Theater, on the west to halfway across the bridge and were in a solid mass from the south City Hall wall to beyond the south side of Broad St.

Governor Lansche, Sen. John W. Bricker, Congressman John M. Vorys, Mayor Sensenbrenner, Deputy Mayor of Genoa Giuseppe DeAndre, and sculptor Edoardo Alfieri, spoke briefly.

For the most part their speeches were similar, each reflecting joy over the fine relations between Italy and America, over the honor being paid to Christopher Columbus, and over the statue itself.

Harold E. Stassen, special assistant to President Eisenhower and the highest ranking guest, extended greetings to the people of Genoa, in his speech, and added:

"I say to them that Americans believe their greatness derives from an unbending dedication to freedom under God. I say to them that the spirit of Genoa is part and parcel of the spirit created at Geneva. I say to them that we are two nations with a common

I have been requested by Mr. James Rhodes, Auditor of State, Columbus, Ohio, to write you some information regarding the position I was offered by the Ohio State University.

As you already know, during October 1955, Mr. Rhodes asked me whether I could accept a teaching position in Sculpture at the University of Ohio, which I accepted with great pleasure.

Following Mr. Rhodes' advice I went to the Cultural Office of the American Embassy in Rome to obtain further information on the subject.

I am now able to give you the following data:

I shall apply for a Fulbright travel grant, covering travel expenses from my home town to the U.S. and return trip. Since my application is due on February 29, I shall need as soon as possible an official letter of appointment by the University of Ohio, indicating the position offered, its duration, and remuneration (the amount of income tax deduction should also be mentioned). In the event I shall be awarded a Fulbright grant, I will apply for an Exchange Visitor's Visa under Program Number G-5. I plan to stay in the U.S. approximately for a period of one to three years. I will take my wife with me. We have no children.

I have already submitted to Mr. Cianflona, Attorney Examiner of Columbus, Ohio, a copy of my school certificates, a curriculum of my professional activity indicating Sculpture exhibits in which I participated, awards and prizes received, etc.

I wish to express you my heartfelt thanks for your moving words on my country at the inauguration of the statue of Christopher Columbus in the capital of Ohio.

Historic Preservation

Introduction

HUD programs support and facilitate the use of historic properties for affordable housing, economic development, and community revitalization. HUD encourages the rehabilitation of historic buildings and the preservation of irreplaceable resources like archeological sites that convey centuries of human cultural activity. The **National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA)** (<https://www.achp.gov/digital-library-section-106-landing/national-historic-preservation-act>), 16 U.S.C. 470 et seq., directs each federal agency, and those tribal, state, and local governments that assume federal agency responsibilities, to protect historic properties and to avoid, minimize, or mitigate possible harm that may result from agency actions. The review process, known as Section 106 review, is detailed in 36 CFR Part 800. Early consideration of historic places in project planning and full consultation with interested parties are key to effective compliance with Section 106. The State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) and/or Tribal Historic Preservation Officer (THPO) are primary consulting parties in the process. A qualified historic preservation consultant may assist with the technical components of the Section 106 review process.

Historic properties are those that are listed in or eligible for listing in the **National Register of Historic Places (NR)** (<https://www.nps.gov/subjects/nationalregister/index.htm>). The National Register is a list of districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects that have been determined by the National Park Service to be significant in American history, architecture, archeology, engineering, and culture, at the local, state or national level. Generally, a property must be at least 50 years old to qualify, but there are exceptions. The grantee should consult the National Register database, existing state and local inventories, local historical and preservation organizations, and local planning departments to identify properties that are listed in or eligible for the National Register.

All assisted activities require Section 106 review except projects that are exempt or 'categorically excluded not subject to' under HUD regulations (24 CFR Parts 50 and 58) or that are determined by HUD to have "No potential to Affect Historic Properties" as defined at 36 CFR 800.3.

HUD Guidance

Compliance with Section 106 is achieved by following the procedures that the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation has outlined in 36 CFR Part 800.

The Section 106 Process consists of four basic steps. After determining the need to do a Section 106 review, the HUD official or Responsible Entity initiates consultation with statutory and other interested parties (**Step 1**), identifies and evaluates historic properties (**Step 2**), assesses effects of the project on properties listed on or eligible for the National Register of Historic Places (**Step 3**), and resolves any adverse effects through project design modifications or mitigation (**Step 4**). Note that consultation continues through all phases of the review.

Step 1. Initiate Consultation

The following parties are entitled to participate in Section 106 reviews: Advisory Council on Historic

Preservation; SHPOs; federally recognized Indian tribes/THPOs; Native Hawaiian Organizations; local governments; and project grantees. The general public and individuals and organizations with a demonstrated interest in a project may also participate as consulting parties. Participation varies with the nature and scope of a project. Refer to resources on this site for guidance on consultation, including the required timeframes for response. Consultation should begin early to enable full consideration of preservation options. See the **SHPO website** (<https://ncshpo.org/directory/>) for state-specific guidance for consulting with them.

Use the *When To Consult With Tribes* checklist found in the appendix of this **notice** (<https://www.hud.gov/sites/documents/12-06cpdn.doc>) to determine if tribes should be invited to consult on a particular project. Use the **Tribal Directory Assessment Tool (TDAT)** (<https://egis.hud.gov/tdat/>) to identify tribes that may have an interest in the area where the project is located.

Step 2. Identify and Evaluate Historic Properties

Define the Area of Potential Effect (APE). Gather information about known historic properties in the APE. Historic buildings, districts and archeological sites may have been identified in local, state, and national surveys and registers, local historic districts, municipal plans, town and county histories, and local history websites. Tribes may identify historic properties of religious and cultural significance to them. If not already listed on the National Register of Historic Places, identified properties are then evaluated to see if they are eligible for the National Register.

Step 3. Assess Effects on Historic Properties

Only properties that are listed on or eligible for the National Register of Historic Places receive further consideration under Section 106. Assess the effect(s) of the project by applying the Criteria of Adverse Effect. (See 36 CFR 800.5). Consider direct and indirect effects as applicable.

Step 4. Resolve Adverse Effects

Work with consulting parties to try to avoid, minimize or mitigate adverse effects. The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation must be notified and given an opportunity to participate in the consultation. Refer to 36 CFR 800.6 and 800.7. Resolution of adverse effects generally results in a Memorandum of Agreement that spells out how the adverse effects will be minimized and/or mitigated. If adverse effects cannot be satisfactorily mitigated, the HUD official or Responsible Entity may disapprove a project.

Compliance and Documentation

It is important to remember that the environmental review record (ERR) must show that Section 106 review was completed before approval is given to proceed with HUD assisted projects.

The environmental review record should contain documentation on **one** of these types of findings:

1. No Historic Properties Affected

- Letter from SHPO (or THPO on tribal lands*) that concurs with HUD's or the Responsible Entity's

determination of “no historic properties affected”

- With documentation on 1) the undertaking and the APE (including photographs, maps, and drawings, as necessary), 2) steps taken to identify historic properties, 3) the basis for determining that no historic properties are present or affected, 4) evidence of tribal consultation if required; and 5) copies or summaries of any views provided by consulting parties and the public
- If the SHPO has not responded to a properly documented request for concurrence within 30 days of receipt of the request, document the request and lack of response as part of the record

2. No Adverse Effect

- Letter from SHPO (or THPO on tribal lands*) that concurs with HUD’S or the Responsible Entity’s finding of “no adverse effect”
- With documentation on 1) the undertaking and the APE (including photographs, maps, and drawings, as necessary), 2) steps taken to identify historic properties, 3) affected historic properties (including characteristics qualifying them for the NR), 4) the undertaking’s effects on historic properties, 5) why the criteria of adverse effect were not applicable (§800.5), 6) evidence of tribal consultation if required, and 7) copies or summaries of any views provided by consulting parties and the public
- If the SHPO has not responded to a properly documented request for concurrence within 30 days of receipt of the request, document the request and lack of response as part of the record

3. Adverse Effect

- Notification of adverse effect sent to Advisory Council on Historic Preservation
- Letter from SHPO (or THPO on tribal lands*) that concurs with a finding of “adverse effect”
- With documentation on 1) the undertaking and the APE (including photographs, maps, and drawings, as necessary), 2) steps taken to identify historic properties, 3) affected historic properties (including characteristics qualifying them for the NR), 4) the undertaking’s effects on historic properties, 5) why the criteria of adverse effect are applicable (§ 800.5), 6) evidence of tribal consultation if required, and 7) copies or summaries of any views provided by consulting parties and the public
- A Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) or a Programmatic Agreement (PA) signed by the HUD official or Responsible Entity, SHPO/THPO, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation if participating, and other signatory and concurring parties
- If resolution is not reached in an MOA or PA, provide correspondence and comments between the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation and HUD Secretary (for Part 50 projects) or Responsible Entity’s chief elected local official (for Part 58 projects)

When do you consult with the THPO in lieu of the SHPO?

If the project occurs on tribal lands, you consult with the THPO in lieu of the SHPO if they have assumed the role of the SHPO on tribal lands. Otherwise, and on non-tribal lands, you consult with the THPO in addition to the SHPO. A party on non-tribal lands that may be affected by a project on tribal lands with a THPO may request that the SHPO participate.

INTRODUCTION

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) is pleased to submit the 2011 Update of the Section 3 Report (2011 Update) in accordance with the requirements of Executive Order 13287 (EO 13287), "Preserve America," specifically Section 3(c) (Section 3). This report updates the Fiscal Year (FY) 2004, 2005, and 2008 Section 3 reports to the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) and the Secretary of the Interior.

Section 3 of the Executive Order requires each Federal agency with real property management responsibilities to prepare an assessment of the current status of its inventory of historic properties as required by Section 110(a)(2) of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) (16 U.S.C. 470h-2(a)(2)). The assessment includes the general condition and management needs of such properties, and steps underway or planned to meet those management needs.

In April 2011, the ACHP released the *Advisory Guidelines Implementing Executive Order 13287, "Preserve America" Section 3: Reporting Progress on the Identification, Protection, and Use of Federal Historic Properties*. This publication contains questions directed to federal agencies with real property management responsibilities. DHS' real property management responsibilities include historic properties owned by the Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA), the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center (FLETC), U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), U.S. Coast Guard (USCG), U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), and the Science & Technology Directorate (S&T). In the 2008 Update, it was reported that the United States Secret Service (USSS) was the owner of the Webster School in the District of Columbia. It has since been determined that the property is actually owned by the General Services Administration (GSA). The USSS does not own any historic properties. The ACHP plans to use agency feedback to measure the effectiveness of historic preservation within federal agencies. Questions posed by ACHP cover three broad areas: Identification, Protection, and Use. For clarity, this report is divided into these three broad categories to mirror the ACHP 2011 Guidelines.



THE DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY

DHS was created by the Homeland Security Act of 2002 in response to the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. The following is DHS' mission: *We will lead the unified national effort to secure America. We will prevent and deter terrorist attacks and protect against and respond to threats and hazards to the Nation. We will secure our national borders while welcoming lawful immigrants, visitors, and trade.*

DHS has limited real property portfolios, and the majority of its business is conducted from property leased from or managed by other Federal entities. An example is that in recent years DHS has been closely associated with the St. Elizabeth campus in the District of Columbia, which is planned to house several DHS headquarters' functions. However, while DHS is a tenant at the St. Elizabeth campus, GSA is responsible for the property as the owner and manager. While DHS' property inventory is limited, there are historic properties within its inventory that range from custom houses to lighthouses.

The nature of the Homeland Security mission also directly impacts the manner in which DHS manages its historic properties. Security considerations require that nearly all DHS historic real property be closed to public access. Only a small number of DHS historic properties allow public access by special appointment.



IDENTIFICATION OF HISTORIC PROPERTIES

The National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) requires Federal agencies to identify historic properties within their real property inventory. Under NHPA and its implementing regulations, identification of historic properties can occur either through an agency-wide survey (Section 110 survey) or through specific project related identification efforts (Section 106 surveys).

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 1: *Building upon previous Section 3 reports, please explain how many historic properties have been identified and evaluated by your agency in the past three years? Has your inventory improved? Please explain.*

DHS' real property management responsibilities include historic properties used by FEMA, FLETC, ICE, CBP, S&T, and USCG. The largest inventory of historic properties within DHS is the USCG's almost two hundred historic lighthouses. Since the 2008 Update, a total of 34 potentially eligible USCG properties have been identified. This includes the evaluation of three archaeological sites, completion of 13 nominations to the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), and evaluations of 18 properties for NRHP eligibility that are in process.

Plum Island, off the coast of New York, has been occupied since the pre-contact era, housed the Fort Terry military installation used through the end of World War II, and is currently the location of S&T's Plum Island Animal Disease Center (PIADC) which dates to 1952. Since the 2008 Update, the Plum Island Light Station (1869-1960) has been listed on the NRHP as of February 11, 2011. DHS will be surveying the remainder of Plum Island for National Register eligible properties during FY 2012.

FEMA is preparing to evaluate the c. 1930 buildings of the Center for Domestic Preparedness in Anniston, Alabama for historic significance. This property is a recent acquisition to the FEMA property inventory. In addition, FEMA is evaluating its Mount Weather Emergency Operations Center (MWEOC) in Virginia to determine its eligibility for listing on the NRHP.

CBP's efforts in identification of historic properties over the past several years have focused on Section 106 compliance. CBP is ensuring they follow 106 requirements for all construction, repair, and renovation projects. Since the 2008 Update, over twenty historic CBP properties have been identified.

ICE, formerly part of CBP, is currently in the process of evaluating its properties for potential historic significance and to ensure 106 requirements are fully met.



ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 2: *Describe your agency policies that promote and/or influence the identification and evaluation of historic properties.*

DHS agency-wide policy for the identification and evaluation of historic properties is found in DHS Directive 017-01, *Historic Preservation in Asset Management and Operations* (Directive 017-01). Directive 017-01, “. . . establishes policy and procedures of appropriate consideration of historic properties and sacred sites in the management and operation of the full range of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) assets. It establishes appropriate DHS roles, responsibilities, and lines of accountability to apply the relevant requirements of historic preservation public policy to DHS activities.” Directive 017-01 is available on-line at http://www.dhs.gov/xlibrary/assets/foia/mgmt_directive_017_01_historic_preservation_in_asset_management_and_operations.pdf. All DHS Components are required to follow Directive 017-01. In addition, a Component may develop its own guidance or directive specific to its needs and missions.

DHS Components are required to fill out an Environmental Planning and Historic Preservation (EP&HP) Scorecard (Scorecard) to evaluate conformance with various EP&HP requirements on a quarterly and annual basis. The FY 2011 Scorecard included a measure that captures Components’ efforts in the identification and tracking of historic properties for Section 110 compliance. The Scorecard is for internal DHS use only.

Because of its unique inventory of historic properties, USCG has developed its own policies for the identification and evaluation of historic properties. USCG participates in the National Historic Lighthouse Preservation Act (NHLPA) and follows USCG Commandant Instruction (COMDTINST) M16475.1D, *National Environmental Policy Act Implementing Procedures and Policy for Considering Environmental Impacts* (which includes policy on Section 106 and Section 110). This document is available on-line at http://www.uscg.mil/directives/cim/16000-16999/CIM_16475_1D.pdf. In the future, the USCG plans to write a historic and cultural resources policy that is aligned with the DHS Directive but which is specific to the USCG.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 3: *How has your agency established goals for the identification and evaluation of historic properties including whether they have been met?*

Goals for the identification and evaluation of historic properties are specific to each Component. FLETC has a goal to document and provide information to the general public about the historic buildings and uses of its campus in Glynco, Georgia. This goal has been met over the past three years through a program to label historic buildings on the campus.

USCG has set goals for the identification and evaluation of all remaining USCG lighthouses for nomination to the NRHP. Determinations of eligibility by the Keeper are included in this goal. USCG has almost completed this goal and is anticipating that all eligible lighthouses will be nominated to the NRHP by FY2014. USCG has also established a target for the identification and evaluation of properties associated with the U.S. Lifesaving Service (USLSS) and pre-1950 USCG boat stations. USCG intends to complete a NRHP Multiple Property documentation form for USLSS stations, houses of refuge, and pre-1950 boat stations. To track the progress of these



initiatives against internal goals, the USCG uses internal management systems and the department-wide EP&HP Scorecard.

S&T's goal after the 2008 Update was the nomination of the Plum Island Lighthouse to the NRHP. This goal was met between the 2008 and 2011 Updates, and it is now focusing on the evaluation of other Plum Island properties. ICE's goal for the identification and evaluation of historic properties aligns with DHS and federal policies and regulations. CBP has set a goal for the inventory of one-third of all properties each year until completed, with updates every five years for newly acquired properties. One of FEMA's goals is to evaluate its Mount Weather facility.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 4: *Describe any internal reporting requirements your agency may have for the identification and evaluation of historic properties, including collections (museum and archaeological).*

Internal reporting of historic properties, including collections, is fairly consistent throughout DHS. All of the Components use the EP&HP Scorecard, and the Components with archaeological collections provide information for the National Park Service's (NPS) annual *Secretary of the Interior's Report to Congress on the Federal Archaeology Program*.

USCG's internal reporting requirements include consultation with the USCG Historian's Office concerning the identification and disposition of artifacts aboard Coast Guard cutters slated for decommissioning, in addition to tracking historic properties using internal management systems and the financial accounting requirements for heritage assets.

S&T has inventory information on the Fourth Order Fresnel lens from the Plum Island Lighthouse that is currently on loan to a museum. FLETC maintains a museum quality display at the Brunswick Golden Isles Airport in Brunswick, Georgia, along with the associated paperwork. ICE maintains a computer database and hardcopy files of all historic properties and sites owned by the agency.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 5: *Explain how your agency has employed the use of partnerships to assist in the identification and evaluation of historic properties.*

DHS is an agency with a mission centered on the security of the country. The majority of DHS real property is actively used for homeland security purposes. Security concerns have been a limiting factor for establishing partnerships to assist in the identification and evaluation of DHS historic properties. Nevertheless, when possible, the department has taken advantage of partnerships to assist in its historic preservation responsibilities.

USCG partners with several historic preservation groups for the lease of USCG-owned lighthouses. The lease holders assume responsibility for maintaining and rehabilitating the lighthouses. These partnerships have resulted in the leaseholders providing relevant and useful information to the USCG when evaluating the properties for NRHP eligibility.

S&T partners with lighthouse enthusiasts to allow access to the Plum Island Lighthouse for exterior tours; the interior of the lighthouse is off limits to the public because of environmental hazards. CBP has had individual projects that have resulted in partnerships with local preservation organizations and universities. The partnerships with universities tend to be limited to curation agreements.

FLETC has a Memorandum of Agreement in place with the Georgia State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Glynn County Historical Society to display framed photographs depicting the history of the Glynco campus. This photo display is part of a series of rotating exhibits that are displayed at the St. Simons Island Lighthouse, which is a historic property. Additionally, FLETC has a partnership with the Brunswick Golden Isles Airport in Brunswick, Georgia for an off-site museum quality display.

DHS also has several mission-related partnerships that may provide benefit to historic preservation and general cultural resources management. CBP missions and geographical reach have led to partnerships with American Indian tribes, and CBP has established tribal liaisons at specific border patrol stations. CBP has also worked closely with both domestic and foreign entities for the repatriation of artifacts, including the recent repatriation of seized Chinese artifacts that occurred in March 2011 in a joint venture with ICE.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 6: *Provide specific examples of major challenges, successes, and or opportunities your agency has experienced in identifying historic properties over the past three years.*

CBP has benefited from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 as its funding has yielded increased resources for the identification and evaluation of ports of entry. The information gained from the identification of the ports of entry is used by CBP to enhance its Section 110 inventory. One success for CBP was the discovery of the archaeological remains of a turn of the century township in Boundary, Washington and the resulting data recovery. This project included outreach and close coordination with local tribes and community organizations to develop a combined Phase II and Phase III data recovery plan.

USCG has been successful in fulfilling its role in the NHPLA three-agency partnership with GSA and NPS. These efforts include preparing NRHP nominations and determinations of eligibility for lighthouses proposed for inclusion in the NHPLA program. From 2002 through the end of 2010, USCG has transferred ownership of 58 lighthouses under NHLPA. To date, 43 have been transferred to qualified nonprofit organizations and state or local government entities, and 15 have been transferred through public sales. Other USCG successes include the development of a NRHP Multiple Property Documentation Form (MPDF) for USLSS stations, houses of refuge, and pre-1950 USCG boat stations, and a preliminary inventory of such properties presently owned by USCG.



FEMA, while having limited identification responsibilities because it only owns a few properties, works diligently to identify historic properties during disaster response and recovery efforts. The disaster work has put FEMA in the forefront of creative mitigation as they work closely with local communities when a resource is lost or damaged. Recent mitigation efforts have included developing educational activities centering around the southern coalfield region of West Virginia, preparation of a historic context evaluating the influence of automobiles on the built environment in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and salvage and reuse of historic features from a high school slated for demolition in New Orleans.

PROTECTION OF HISTORIC PROPERTIES

The consideration of historic properties, both agency owned and non-agency owned, is a federal agency responsibility that is specified in 36 CFR Part 800 and Section 106 of the NHPA. Consideration of historic properties can lead to protection through the Section 106 process as various outcomes are examined, including avoidance and mitigation.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 7: *Explain how your agency has protected historic properties.*

Protection of DHS-owned historic properties is accomplished daily through appropriate maintenance and repair. The methods used to protect historic properties in DHS' inventory vary based on mission needs. For example, USCG's historic properties that are not currently being used are protected through mothballing after consultation with the appropriate SHPO. Mothballing includes closing off windows and entrances while allowing for ventilation. It also includes the restriction of unauthorized access through passive measures such as fencing. These protective measures have been implemented for the nationwide system of USCG LORAN-C stations that were decommissioned in 2010. Leases are also a form of protection of historic properties used by USCG. The lease agreements contain conditions for the protection of the historic character of the properties by the lessee.

Maintenance and repair are the cornerstones of FLETC's protection of historic properties. They currently maintain two historic districts and various individual historic properties on the Glynco campus. FLETC also meticulously documents each historic property at Glynco that is no longer being used by FLETC but is left in place. The documentation is accomplished in consultation with the SHPO. ICE is a strong advocate of adaptive use for historic properties. CBP is currently using all of its historic properties for agency activities. S&T nominated Plum Island Lighthouse to the NRHP.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 8: *Describe the programs and procedures your agency has established to ensure the protection of historic properties, including compliance with Sections 106, 110, and 111 of NHPA.*

In general, DHS relies on the law and implementing regulations for Section 106 and DHS Directive 017-01, and the EP&HP Scorecard to aid in the protection of historic properties. DHS also has an Environmental Planning and Historic Preservation Committee comprised of natural



and cultural resources staff from each DHS Component; monthly Committee meetings and an email distribution list are an important means of sharing information and best practices among the historic preservation practitioners in DHS. In recent years, the number of staff with historic preservation expertise at DHS Headquarters and in the Components has increased, thereby improving DHS' ability to address historic preservation considerations. With its focus on the homeland security mission, DHS frequently meets its Section 110 responsibilities through Section 106 compliance on individual activities. Security issues preclude the use of Section 111 for most DHS Components, with the exception of lighthouses in the USCG.

DHS also promotes and protects its historic properties through the development and use of guidance documents and policies, training of staff and contractors, establishment of component-level preservation programs and offices, NRHP nominations, direct use, and lease agreements. For example, CBP's historic preservation handbook for CBP personnel addresses Section 106, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), and the Archaeological Resources Protection Act (ARPA). Another example is the previously discussed policy and guidance documents that USCG follows to ensure compliance with environmental planning requirements, including NHPA.

DHS is fully compliant with NHPA Sections 106 and 110. USCG has established programs and procedures to ensure the protection of historic properties. The programs include the USCG's NHLPA Program in the Office of Environmental Management (COMDT CG-47). This program coordinates the documentation and disposition of historic lighthouses identified as surplus to USCG needs. The USCG Surface Infrastructure Logistics Center (SILC) includes an Environmental Management Division that provides advice and guidance to Environmental Protection Specialists at the various field units, including but not limited to USCG Civil Engineering Units (CEUs) at Providence, RI, Cleveland, OH, Miami, FL, Oakland, CA, Juneau, AK, and Honolulu, HI. As previously discussed, Section 111 compliance is robust within the USCG through the use of lease agreements with various entities. FEMA has a robust Section 106 training program and has historic preservation staff in each of its 10 regional offices and Headquarters to oversee Section 106 compliance.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 9: *Describe your agency policies that promote and/or influence the protection of historic properties.*

As previously discussed, all DHS Components are required to follow DHS Directive 017-01 and the EP&HP Scorecard, and the Components with archaeological collections provide information for the NPS's annual *Secretary of the Interior's Report to Congress on the Federal Archaeology Program*. The USCG policies that promote and/or influence the protection of historic properties include adhering to M16465.1D. The USCG also utilizes guidance concerning lighthouse maintenance in the form of a handbook created in partnership with NPS, as well as published policy by the USCG Historian's Office on the care and maintenance of classical Fresnel lenses that are provided on loan for display, or transferred pursuant to NHLPA, to nonprofit organizations, museums, and state and local government entities.



ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 10: *Explain how your agency has employed the use of partnerships to assist in the protection of historic properties.*

Partnerships with outside entities have traditionally been difficult for DHS because of security concerns and prohibitions. However, difficult does not mean impossible.

As previously discussed, USCG has partnered with various historic preservation groups, and state and local government agencies for leasing historic lighthouses. The entity awarded the lease assumes responsibility for maintenance and rehabilitation of the property. USCG also partners with SHPOs concerning the management of historic properties through consultations pursuant to NHPA Section 106 and NRHP nominations pursuant to NHPA Section 110. USCG has been successful in fulfilling its role in the NHLPA three-agency partnership with NPS and USCG.

FEMA is the co-sponsor of the Heritage Emergency National Task Force (Task Force). The Task Force is a coalition of federal agencies and national and regional service organizations working together to ensure that cultural institutions and the public receive timely information and assistance during disasters. The Task Force has focused its recent efforts on strengthening the relationships between the cultural heritage community and first responders and emergency managers. In addition to FEMA, NPS, National Archives and Records Administration, and the Smithsonian are actively involved in the Task Force.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 11: *Provide specific examples of major challenges, successes, and/or opportunities your agency has encountered in protecting historic properties over the past three years.*

The most significant challenge in DHS remains associated with its efforts to integrate its historic preservation responsibilities into its homeland security mission areas. Its breadth of missions often results in DHS encountering a wide range of historic property types, such as vessels, prehistoric archeology, and neighborhoods developed after World War II. In addition, many of its activities, where historic properties are implicated, occur on property that is not under federal control; such as with activities along the land borders, in airports, with bridge administration, and disaster mitigation. Challenges in these situations involve engaging non-federal parties in the federal Section 106 process, which may include historic property identification effort. With its own historic properties, challenges typically involve project specific situations, when operational needs impact historic properties (e.g., a building construction or renovation project to accommodate an increased number of personnel or to improve physical security). These types of challenges typically involve issues with project funding and scheduling that are resolved through project management intervention.

DHS generally understands the nature of the historic properties over which it has direct responsibility. Successes in protecting historic properties over the past three years include FLETC's program to place signs and establish displays addressing historic properties at the Glynco campus. Examples of USCG successes in protecting historic properties over the past three years involve completing NRHP nominations and determinations of eligibility for lighthouses slated for entry in the NHLPA program, and the various lease agreements. FEMA is



actively looking to engage in more training and cooperation with state agencies to bolster Section 106 compliance

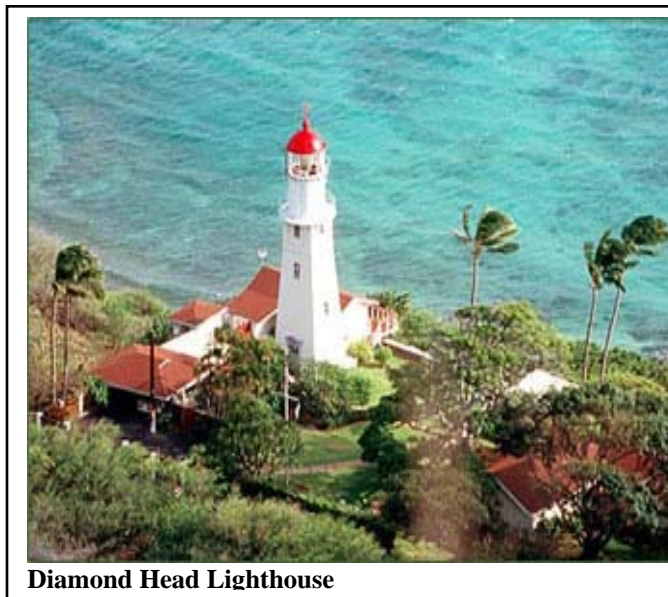
USE OF HISTORIC PROPERTIES

The use of historic properties enhances agency awareness of historic preservation through constant exposure to the needs and importance of historic properties. Maintaining and using historic properties also provides a richer landscape for the public as the progression of type, style, and use of properties can be experienced.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 12: *Explain how your agency has used historic properties.*

DHS uses its historic properties either for the original use of the property or through adaptive use. For example, the former St. Joseph's College campus in Emmitsburg, Maryland, once a Catholic school for girls from the early 1800s to the 1970s, is now the home of the National Emergency Training Center/Emergency Management Institute, which is used for training of federal, state and local homeland security personnel, and the United States Fire Administration. It was listed on the NRHP in 1976.

At FLETC's Glynco campus, a former naval air station established in 1942, bermed bunkers and historic buildings have a variety of uses, including a National Industries for the Blind store, a uniform supply vendor, a print shop, the official FLETC movers/warehousing, roll player contractor offices (for training scenarios), a custodial contractor, and a maintenance contractor.

USCG has used historic lighthouses as active Federal aids to navigation (ATONs) until such time that the property's use as a Federal aid can be terminated. Several active lighthouse properties that include keeper dwellings are also used for USCG housing or recreational quarters for USCG personnel. An example of this is Diamond Head Light in Hawaii, which is used as the official residence of the Commanding Officer of USCG District 14. Other active lighthouse properties include buildings occupied for Federal government offices such as Portsmouth Harbor Light in New Hampshire.

ICE and CBP use all of their historic properties in some form, often achieved by applying adaptive use to historic properties.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 13: *Explain the overall condition of the historic properties within your agency's control.*



DHS is generally able to maintain most of its historic buildings in good condition because they are currently in use. However, challenges sometimes arise. Maintenance challenges arise with those historic properties located in coastal environments, such as USCG and FLETC properties. Health and safety hazards can make human occupation of historic properties unsuitable, as is the case with the Plum Island Lighthouse.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 14: *Describe your agency policies that promote and/or influence the use of its historic properties.*

DHS Directive 017-01 directly influences the use of historic properties in all components of the department. In addition, DHS real property management policies and procedures follow federal law, regulations, and the Scorecard.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 15: *Explain how your agency has used Section 111 (16 U.S.C. § 470h-3) of NHPA in the protection of historic properties.*

As previously discussed, the use of Section 111 by DHS Components is usually precluded because of security concerns. USCG is the exception as it has used Section 111 by leasing automated lighthouses to groups that assume responsibility for maintaining and rehabilitating these properties. This program has the added benefit of enhancing local historic properties for the community.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 16: *Explain how your agency has employed the use of partnerships to assist in the use of historic properties.*

Security issues generally prevent the development of partnerships in the use of DHS-owned facilities. However, as previously discussed, USCG has used partnerships to assist in the use of historic properties by leasing historic lighthouses to groups that assume responsibility for maintaining them.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 17: *Provide specific examples of major challenges, successes, and/or opportunities your agency has encountered in using historic properties over the past three years.*

FLETC is facing maintenance issues relating to asbestos, lead, and mold that put the continued use of its historic properties in question. Similarly, CBP has had to demolish some buildings (after completing Section 106 consultation) because of health and safety issues.

ACHP Advisory Guidelines Question 18: *Describe your agency's sustainability goals in accordance with EO 13514 and how these goals are being met, taking stewardship of historic properties into account.*

All DHS sustainability goals, in response to EO 13514, are formulated in accordance with DHS policy and guidance and may be found in the Department's Strategic Sustainability Performance Plan (SSPP). DHS has created an Executive-level sustainability working group to develop its plans for addressing sustainability and mission responsibilities. Additionally, each Component



has two executive-level representatives who are working the issues at the headquarters level and each Component has developed its own Operational Sustainability Performance Plan (OSPP) which highlights its goals and objectives for supporting the Department's sustainability commitments. The first meeting of the executive group was held in August 2011.

CONCLUSION

DHS, created less than a decade ago from 22 other federal agencies and departments, has made great strides in establishing a historic preservation program that includes a centralized function at DHS headquarters and Component-centric historic preservation programs. The creation of a centralized program in conjunction with Component programs has resulted in a more consistent approach to historic preservation throughout the Department while still recognizing the individuality of the Components' missions and historic properties. This construct has allowed both smaller Components and those that are larger to meet the same DHS requirements for historic preservation while maintaining a certain level of autonomy to address individual Component needs. For example, unique conditions in the USCG allow it to benefit from leasing its lighthouses; however security requirements in other components, such as S&T, normally preclude the leasing of lighthouses. DHS is a prime example of "one size does not fit all" in terms of historic preservation.

DHS looks forward to implementing new initiatives and continuing to enhance its existing programs to identify, protect, and use historic properties. DHS is constantly moving forward to meet its mission and stewardship requirements, learning from individual challenges and expanding upon Component successes.

2.2.1 Red Flag Summary Report

The lone red flag cultural resource in the project area is the Civic Center Historic District. The District was determined eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) on September 14, 1988. It is eligible under Criterion A for its association with community planning, engineering, politics/government, and transportation in the city of Columbus, and Criterion C for its Art Deco, Neoclassical, and Renaissance Revival architecture. The District has two components: riverfront improvements, including a retaining wall (between 40 feet north of Broad Street and 40 feet south of Town Street) and three contributing bridges (Broad, Town, and Main streets, all now demolished and replaced), and seven government buildings, five of which are contributing resources (Central High School [individually listed in the NRHP], State Office Building [individually listed in the NRHP], City Hall, Central Police Station, and the Federal Court House and Post Office), two of which are non-contributing resources (the buildings immediately north and south of the State Office Building). The District does not include the Main Street Dam, which is located immediately south of the District.

The majority of the riverfront improvements were built between 1917 and 1921. All were designed in the Renaissance Revival style and erected after the width of the Scioto River had significantly widened as a result of flood protection improvements, including construction of the Main Street Dam in 1921, in response to the devastating flood of 1913. The government buildings were built after the riverfront improvements. They were built in the Neoclassical and Art Deco styles.

The approximate boundaries of the District are from Main Street north along Washington Boulevard to Town Street, west on Town Street to Belle Street, north on Belle Street to Broad Street, east on Broad Street to the western bank of the Scioto River, north along the Scioto River bank to a point opposite West Long Street, east across the Scioto River to West Long Street, east along West Long Street to Marconi Boulevard, south on Marconi Boulevard to a point opposite the first alley south of West Long Street, east along the alley to Ludlow Alley, south along Ludlow Alley to West Gay Street, east along West Gay Street to North Front Street, south along North Front Street to Broad Street, west along Broad Street to Civic Center Drive, and south along Civic Center Drive to Main Street.

Pertaining to the District, on June 26, 2009, a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) executed between the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), Huntington District, the Ohio Historic Preservation Office (OHPO), and the City of Columbus governing the expansion of the John W. Galbreath Bicentennial Park included the following stipulations:

- 1) The City's Department of Development will coordinate the review of all projects within the boundaries of the Columbus Civic Center Historic District with the City's Historic Preservation Office, the Columbus Historic Resources Commission, and the CLF, provided that by June 26, 2014, the projects have not reached the engineering phase;
- 2) For those projects, the City's Department of Development will present the City's Historic Preservation Office, the Columbus Historic Resources Commission, the CLF, the U.S.

- Ohio Historic Inventory (OHI) forms
- Ohio Historic Bridge Inventory and Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) Bridge Inventory forms
- Contract architectural history reports
- Historic American Engineering Record files
- USGS 7.5' topographic maps associated with the Ohio Archaeological Inventory (OAI)
- OAI forms
- Contract archaeology reports, and
- Mills' (1914) *Archeological Atlas of Ohio*.

Also consulted was ODOT's Buckeye Assets (2011).

The literature review identified a number of extant cultural resources in the study area. The lone archaeological site recorded in the study area is 33FR564. Skinner and Nass (1985) concluded that the prehistoric component of the site was a secondary deposit above historic fill, the latter of which extended at least five meters below the surface. The fill composing the historic period component contained twentieth-century kitchen and architectural debris dumped at the site, possibly from another location. The site was recommended ineligible for the NRHP. The Skinner and Nass (1985) archaeological investigation was conducted prior to the proposed development of a hotel and restaurant at what is now Confluence Park.

Two other areas have been surveyed for archaeological resources in the study area: North Bank Park (Brown 2003) and the West Columbus Floodwall (Walsh and Miller 1992). Neither identified archaeological sites in the study area. Mills (1914) does not show any archaeological sites in or adjacent to the study area.

The foremost architectural historical resource in the study area is the Columbus Civic Center Historic District. The district was determined eligible for listing in the NRHP on September 14, 1988. It is eligible under Criterion A for its association with community planning, engineering, politics/government, and transportation in the city of Columbus, and Criterion C for its Art Deco, Neoclassical, and Renaissance Revival architecture. The District has two components: riverfront improvements, including a retaining wall (between 40 feet north of Broad Street

and 40 feet and south of Town Street) and three contributing bridges (Broad, Town, and Main streets, all now demolished and replaced), and seven government buildings, five of which are contributing resources (Central High School [individually listed in the NRHP], State Office Building [individually listed in the NRHP], City Hall, Central Police Station, and the Federal Court House and Post Office), two of which are non-contributing resources (the buildings immediately north and south of the State Office Building).

All were designed in the Renaissance Revival style and erected after the width of the Scioto River had been doubled or tripled as a result of flood protection improvements, including construction of the Main Street Dam in 1918, in response to the devastating flood of 1913. The government buildings were built after the riverfront improvements. They were built in the Neoclassical and Art Deco styles.

The approximate boundaries of the District are from Main Street north along Washington Boulevard to Town Street, west on Town Street to Belle Street, north on Belle Street to Broad Street, east on Broad Street to the western bank of the Scioto River, north along the Scioto River bank to a point opposite West Long Street, east across the Scioto River to West Long Street, east along West Long Street to Marconi Boulevard, south on Marconi Boulevard to a point opposite the first alley south of West Long Street, east along the alley to Ludlow Alley, south along Ludlow Alley to West Gay Street, east along West Gay Street to North Front Street, south along North Front Street to Broad Street, west along Broad Street to Civic Center Drive, and south along Civic Center Drive to Main Street.



The city of Columbus, an OHPO and National Park Service Certified Local Government, includes the Scioto River Bridge Group in the Columbus Register of Historic Properties, so listed in 1983.

Other extant architectural historical resources in or near the study area are the Jaeger Machine Company Office Building (listed in the NRHP), four railroad bridges, FRA-240-16 (Franklin County Veterans Memorial), Franklinton Marble Works, and Sunshine (Dodge) Park. ODOT (2011) records six bridges in the study area. Four are recorded as "not historic," one was recorded as "not determined" and the sixth was recorded as "none/not applicable." Five architectural historical surveys have been undertaken in the study area: Broad Street/Old National Road (Miller et al. 1998, downtown Columbus (Recchie and Darbee 1989, 1990), and east Franklinton (Burant 1994; Potterfield 1989). Before their demolition, the Broad, Town, and Main Street bridges were documented in the Historic American Engineering Record (Engle 2002; Hampton et al. 2008; Sherman 1989). According to Troutman (2003), no cemeteries are in or adjacent to the study area.
